

Eric Cylvick, candidate for North Summit School Board Seat 5

Eric Cylvick earned his Electrical and Computer Engineering degree from Clarkson University and has lived in 'North' Summit County for nearly three decades. After living in Park City for ten years, he built his family's home, largely by hand, in Tollgate Canyon in 1998. He and his wife have lived there for 28 years and have raised two sons, the oldest a 2026 North Summit High School graduate, and the youngest now a junior and member of the NSHS Wrestling team.

Eric is an engineer, inventor, and entrepreneur with more than 25 years of experience designing and installing some of the world's largest commercial zip lines (ZipRider). Eric specializes in analyzing terrain, interpreting engineering plans, and building ride systems that are safe, efficient, and financially sound. Over decades of work, he has never issued a change order unless the project scope changed—demonstrating understanding of project material and installation costs.

Eric also served more than 20 years as President of the Pine Meadow Mutual Water Company, where he led a complete rebuild of the community's water system. He secured a low-interest \$7 million loan from the Federal Division of Drinking Water and installed 60,000 feet of water lines and 135 fire hydrants, built a 500,000-gallon storage tank, and completed the project under budget—without special assessments or major rate increases. This upgrade transformed Tollgate Canyon from a seasonal community, where water was shut off from October to May, into a full-time community where families can live year-round without being burdened by high assessments.

In that role, Eric ran public board meetings where questions were answered directly, financials were shared openly, and decisions were explained clearly. His leadership emphasized transparency, protected fixed-income residents, and strengthened trust across the community.

Eric is running for the North Summit School Board to bring this same level of transparency, fiscal discipline, and real-world experience to the district. With major facility decisions ahead, and growing concern about decisions being made without full public visibility, Eric is committed to ensuring future actions are open, accountable, and aligned with the community's voice.

For Eric, the future of North Summit schools is personal. His focus is simple: responsible planning, clear communication, and protecting the families and taxpayers who support North Summit schools.
